

Defining ÄMKA

Albert Arlen (1925-1992) of Munster/Alsace developed Atlas Therapy, a gentle MM impulse technique that mainly affects the nervous centers responsible for regulating muscular tension, the autonomous nervous centers, the equilibrium and proprioception – Atlas Therapy is used in addition to other manual techniques

Arlen's approach led to a new understanding of the physiological effects of MM

Atlas Therapy can safely be used in children – a new approach to MM in Children was developed

The Students of Albert Arlen founded ÄMKA in 1992

We only train post-graduate practitioners


